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Course Descriptions

OSS 1400 - Microcomputer Applications in Business. Using microcomputers at school and work. How to operate a PC. Includes operating systems, word processing, Internet, graphics, database, and spreadsheet applications. Includes preparation for University Studies Computer and Information Literacy Examination. (3.0 cr.) Prerequisite: Ability to keyboard at a minimum of 25 wpm

Engl 1010 - (CL) Intro to Writing. Students learn skills and strategies for becoming successful academic readers, writers, and speakers; such as how to read and write critically, generate and develop ideas, work through multiple drafts, collaborate with peers, present ideas orally, and use computers as writing tools. (3.0 cr.)

FCHD 1500 - (SS) Human Development. Overview of human development across the life-span from conception to death. (3.0 cr.)

PSY 1010 - (SS) General Psychology. Explores basic areas of psychology and how each explains human thought and behavior at the individual, family, and cultural levels. (3.0 cr.)

MATH 1010 Intermediate Algebra. Linear equations and inequalities, polynomials and exponents, rational expressions, roots and radicals, quadratic equations, lines and systems of linear equations. Prerequisite: One of the following within the Math prerequisite acceptability time limit: (1) C- or better in MATH 0900, (2) Math ACT score between 18 and 22 (Math SAT score between 480 and 530) and satisfactory Math Placement Test score, (3) Math ACT score of at least 23 (Math SAT score of at least 540), or (4) satisfactory score on Math Placement exam. (4.0 cr) Available to ONLY RURAL District Students.

MATH 1050 QL College Algebra Functions: graphs, transformations, combinations, and inverses. Polynomial, rational, exponential, logarithmic functions, and applications. Systems of equations and matrices. Partial fractions. Graphing calculator required. Prerequisite: C or better in MATH 1010, or Math ACT score of at least 23 (Math SAT score of at least 540), or AP calculus

score of at least 3 on the AB exam, or satisfactory score on Math Placement Test within the Math prerequisite acceptability time limit. (4.0 cr)

MATH 1060 Trigonometry Trigonometric functions, equations, identities, and applications. Graphing calculator required. Prerequisite: C or better in MATH 1010 (or MATH 1050), or Math ACT score of at least 23 (Math SAT score of at least 540), or AP calculus score of at least 3 on the AB exam, or satisfactory score on Math Placement Test within the Math prerequisite acceptability time limit. May be taken concurrently with MATH 1050. (2.0 cr)

PFP 1050 – Introduction to Personal Financial Planning. Introduction to concepts of financial planning for individuals.

Humanities 1320 - (HU) Civilization: Humanities. Provides basic understanding of a broad range of themes which cut across human history and continue to be important in contemporary society. (3.0 cr.)

Hist 1700 – (BAI) American Civilization. Fundamentals of American civilization. Covers history, political system, and economic institutions of the United States. Fulfills American Institutions requirement. (3.0 cr)
